I grow this for three reasons: a grandmother of mine had one of these and I loved the blooms and scent when I was at her house, the sphinx moths are fun to watch nectar on

when it blooms in the early evening, and it is a larval host plant for the Tomato and

a must have for the avid butterfly gardener as it is a host for both the Goatweed and Gray

I have found this growing in full shade where it on;y grows to about 8" and in full sun where

a nice strong pink color, I see this growing very well by the sides of the highways in central

native to the Ozark region of eastern OK, this coneflower is a paradox with bright yellow

flowers off and on all summer so it is a reliable nectar spot, deadhead to encourage more

I know what this one is **not:** isn't purpurea, isn't atrorubens, isn't angustifolia, isn't pallida, so I'm left wondering, maybe E paradoxa var paradoxa which is found in the Arbuckles? It's tall on a very sturdy stem and a nice purple, the seedheads persist through the winter and

this one likes it hot and does very well on the dry side in a well-drained soil, lots and lots of bloom, the ray petals have a neat way of folding under when it's hot so they look like a

I'm labeling it as "Chickasaw Coneflower" because it was found near the Chickasaw

it can get fairly tall, if it is in sun it needs more water--or "big gulps" every now and then, prefers sandy to rocky soil, these are from seed this year so patience may be required

eaten back to the stems by butterfly larvae, but no worry--it will quickly re-leaf
